He added that we are very surprised and pleased with the rate that was proposed which is an indicator that today is a good time to move forward with the proposed projects.

Manager DeFinis stated that what we are standing in as a tear down. We have been through this building several times with Engineers and our current insurance provider is constantly asking when this building is getting torn down due to its deteriorating conditions. Manager DeFinis added that we have a serious structural problems with the building as well as electrical; we are maxed.

It would be for Borough facilities and equipment including without limitation the following:

Construction of a new municipal building; road reconstruction and sanitary sewer replacement on North Main Street; and sanitary sewer rehabilitation project from North Main Street to the intercepter. And they are listed on Exhibit A to the Ordinance.

The Ordinance contains a general authorization for the issuance of the debt. It, as I said, states the maximum principle amount of the note. It notes that the indebtedness is evidenced by the note is nonelectoral under the Debt Act, which is what governs the Borough's incurrence of the

debt. Also, that it is a general obligation of the Borough, to which the Borough is pledging its full faith credit and taxing power.

It authorizes the acceptance of the proposal from ESSA Bank and Trust Company, which I noted earlier, and then authorizes certain officers to sign documents to do everything else necessary in connection with the financing to consummate it.

There are covenants contained in the Ordinance that allow the interest on the note to be tax exempt. You will see that in Section 15.

I believe those are the highlights of the Ordinance. And it has been reviewed by your Solicitor as well.

MS. HARPER: Before you get to the financing, Suzanne, could you explain that "nonelectoral" means that the Borough is not required to go the voters for this.

MS. MAYES: That is correct.

So under the Debt Act there's 1 the electoral debt and nonelectoral. 2 Electoral requires a referendum and --3 you know, a ballot question. This is 4 being done as nonelectoral, and there 5 are certain limits under which 6 7 governmental entities in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania can issue 8 debt without taking it to voters and 9 getting approval, and this is 10 nonelectoral in that sense. 11 MAYOR KALER: Kate, I don't 12 understand. We probably inserted the name of the lender -- but no material changes. It was just to conform it to, you know, what had developed since we circulated the draft.

You will see a maximum repayment schedule which is attached on Schedule I to the Ordinance. This is a drawdown facility, so in -- it is possible that not all \$4 million will be drawn down. If that's the case, then the amortization or the repayment schedule will be adjusted accordingly. But the Ordinance authorizes principle payments not to exceed the level shown on Schedule I.

And that Schedule I is in the form of a bond, Exhibit C. And then within the form -- I said "bond," it's actually a note. Within the form of a note itself, you will also see in the second full paragraph the interest provision for the note.

So it will bear interest at a fixed rate of 2.04 percent per annum until the June 1, 2026. And then from June of 2026, until maturity, which is June 1, 2031, it will bear interest in an annual fixed rate of 60 percent of essentially prime right, with a maximum interest rate not to exceed two-nine-five -- 2.95 percent per annum. They're the basic terms of the borrowing.

I am happy to have, if you'd like, Jamie, your financial adviser with PFM, is here if you would like him to do a little bit more of a summary of kind of the process and the evaluation of the financial terms, you know, it's

In comparison, on Page 5, just to give the Borough an idea of what the

value of the drawdown is, we made an assumption of the draws for the particular project -- in a conservative fashion -- but in this case it gives you an idea of what the payments will be the first two or three years while you're drawing the money.

So, the benefit here is approximately \$70,000 of interest, that's on the bottom of column four, which shows an \$821,059 total interest, in comparison to the previous page which is \$898,000 and change.

So, just from the value of the draw you save a whole bunch of money -- obviously depending on how fast or slow you spend it, it will adjust for that, but it will give you an idea of how it will look.

MS. HARPER: That would be over the life of the loan?

MR. SCHLESINGER: That's correct.

MS. HARPER: But from the

Borough's perspective, the ability to draw the money down as needed will also reduce the repayment?

MR. SCHLESINGER: Well, the principle payments will be established as is at settlement.

MS. HARPER: At settlement.

MR. SCHLESINGER: But if you don't use all the money we would reestablish that amortization table. So it could be two-and-a-half million there effectively -- because you're using all \$4 million and assuming some sort of draw schedule.

MS. MAYES: The drawdown nature though does save you interest on money that you are not ready to use. So you wait and you draw it down when you are ready to pay an invoice, and therefore you don't have it sitting earning nothing.

MS. HARPER: Right. But it also effects how the Borough budgets go.

I just want to make sure everybody's

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clear on that.

MR. SCHLESINGER: We did look into the cash flow of the Borough and feel comfortable that things will work out favorable in regard to the payback.

The only other thing I want to point out, as you know, we went into a lot of detail last meeting. The other change was the breakdown of the costs associated with financing, on Page 6.

This is the expected sources and uses — again assuming you use all \$4 million.

One major difference is the amount of money available for the project increased to \$3,944,250. That is because the estimated cost issuance previously was higher.

Now we have narrowed it down, the cost you pay to us, to Cozen O'Connor, the Solicitor, and bank fees are shown there. We get paid \$27,500 and a legal fee combination \$23,500, bank fees \$1,500, and some miscellaneous. It may be less, but

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again it's the ultimate cost of the 1 project. You will have a little more 2 money than shown at the last meeting. 3 Finally, if all things go as 4 planned we expect to settle on May 25th. 5 That's when you will have the money 6 available for projects. 7 MR. KEIB: I have a question 8 for Suzanne. You mentioned the 9 electoral versus nonelectoral. 10 MS. MAYES: Yes. 11 MR. KEIB: What are the limits 12 for the nonelectoral debt? 13 MS. MAYES: Let me pull that. 14 MR. SCHLESINGER: 15 she's pulling that --16 MS. MAYES: So for straight 17 nonelectoral debt it's 250 percent of 18 your borrowing base, which is an average 19 of your three-year revenue essentially. 20 And then if you also add to 21 it -- there's also a separate limit 2.2 which applies to both your nonelectoral 23 debt and lease/rental debt, if you were 24

to have any, and that then becomes the combined. The aggregate of those two types of borrowing, you are limited to 250 percent of your borrowing base.

And your borrowing base, like
I said, is essentially gross revenue -an average of your gross revenue over
the last three years, four years, with
certain deductions. But you really have
had no deductions generally.

MR. KEIB: After calculating the revenue of the Borough, what is our --

MS. MAYES: Your borrowing base number is \$6,624,462.

MR. KEIB: We are well under that then?

MS. MAYES: Oh, yes, you are.

I mean I can give you the nonelectoral debt limit, which is 250 percent of that borrowing base, is \$16,500,000 and change. And the applicable limit for nonelectoral debt, plus incidental debt, is 350 percent of your borrowing base,

1	is \$23 million, approximately. So you
2	are well, well below your borrowing
3	limit.
4	MR. KEIB: Thank you very much
5	for going through it.
6	MS. MAYES: Certainly. Good
7	question.
8	MR. KEIB: Thank you. Make
9	sure we're under.
10	MS. MAYES: Yes.
11	MR. SCHLESINGER: That's one
12	things we checked on.
13	MR. KEIB: Yeah. I want to
14	hear it.
15	MS. MAYES: And actually a
16	filing is made as part of the filing
17	with the Department of Community and
18	Economic Development with the state, in
19	order to get approval, because the state
20	has to approve the occurrence of the
21	debt, they require a filing of both your
22	borrowing base calculation and your
23	current debt statement certified by the
24	Borough, so that they can, you know,

record and make certain that you are within the requirements of the statute.

MR. KEIB: Very good to get that on the record.

MR. WEIERMAN: Other questions?

(No audible response.)

MS. HARPER: Now, from here,
Suzanne, after the hearing is closed,
also on the Borough Council's Agenda for
this evening is to actually take a vote
on the Ordinance. So, we will be doing
that later tonight.

MS. MAYES: That's fine.

MS. HARPER: What other official action do they need to do? Just that?

MS. MAYES: Yes, I believe nothing else. I think we can close the hearing if there are no other questions or comments, and then we'll come back to the actual consideration of the Ordinance for enactment, and you will do a roll call vote when you are ready to

consider it.

MS. HARPER: Okay.

And then your office will prepare and send notices as necessary of that action?

MS. MAYES: That's correct.

We will have published -- in fact, we will send to the paper tomorrow morning the Notice of Enactment. That's required by the Debt Act, the Act that governs and confirms the debt in the state of Pennsylvania. And it will notify the public that an Ordinance was enacted, and give a summary of the final terms of the accepted proposal, in summary form.

And once we get proof of publication back for that notice we will file certified copies of both notices — the Notice of Meeting and the Notice of Enactment, together with the borrowing base, debt statement, a fully executed enacted Ordinance, and a transmittal letter with the Department of Community

and Economic Development.

They have 20 days to review the filing and supply an approval. And we will not proceed to closing until we have the DCED approval. And the schedule that Jamie has put together and has discussed with you takes into account that 20-day cycle.

MS. HARPER: All right. And then we should have all of that done before the expected closing date of May 25th.

MS. MAYES: That is correct.

And it was timed -- the closing date was timed to allow that process to run. You would not want -- you cannot issue the debt until you have that approval.

MS. HARPER: Okay.

MR. WEIERMAN: Anyone else?
(No audible response.)

MR. WEIERMAN: Hearing none, do I have a motion for closing the hearing?

MR. FARRALL: I make that

11	MR. WEIERMAN: Any opposed?
12	(No audible response.)
13	MR. WEIERMAN: Hearing is
14	closed.

16	(Whereupon, the hearing was
17	concluded, immediately followed by a
18	Motion.)
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1	MR. WEIERMAN: We can go to
2	Action Item 8-A, a Motion to Approve
3	Ordinance No. 522 Regarding the General
4	Obligation Note for the Municipal
5	Complex.
6	MR. FARRALL: I make that
7	motion.
8	MR. KEIB: Second.
9	MR. STEVENS: Second.
10	MR. WEIERMAN: Motion by
11	Council Farrall. And I will give it to
12	Council Keib.
13	And one of the exhibits here.
14	MS. MAYES: The very last
15	page.
16	MR. WEIERMAN: Well, actually
17	not an exhibit, just the Certificate of
18	Secretary on the last page. And by roll
19	call vote.
20	THE SECRETARY: President
21	Weierman.
22	MR. WEIERMAN: Aye.
23	THE SECRETARY: Vice-President
24	Farrall.

1	MR. FARRALL: Yes.
2	THE SECRETARY: Council Member
3	Keib.
4	MR. KEIB: Yes.
5	THE SECRETARY: Council Member
6	Kroesser.
7	MR. KROESSER: Yes.
8	THE SECRETARY: Council Member
9	Stevens.
10	MR. STEVENS: Yes.

20	approval line on the actual physical

22	the roll call, but

24	he has five days, but he's sitting here

1	tonight, so if he's got a problem he'll
2	let us know.
3	MAYOR KALER: I'll let you
4	know on day five.
