UPDATES FROM BOROUGH COUNCIL

THE BOROUGH OF HATFIELD POWER REPORT

The Borough of Hatfield has experienced a number of Power Outages over the past several months. As you might imagine Borough Council is as dismayed and dissatisfied as the residents and businesses in the Borough. Borough Council has directed staff to identify the issues and come up with a plan to correct them.

Identifying the source of the outages is the first step. The Borough has experienced equipment difficulty and bad weather during these outages. PPL has also experienced faults on its distribution system. The Borough's equipment troubles can be addressed several ways. Updating the three electric circuits is an ongoing endeavor, having said that, the Borough Public Works Department is constantly looking for best practices in maintaining the electric system. Identifying potential fragile apparatus of the electric system is a continuous undertaking. The PPL caused outages are being coordinated with their representatives.

The Borough utilizes several methods of identifying danger. Borough crews are constantly on the lookout for faulty equipment. Visual inspections are performed daily. Infra Red testing is done periodically. Pole inspections are routinely performed. Transformer testing can be performed (with the use of a tilt tester) prior to installing units and during repairs to existing services. Using more efficient mechanical clamping equipment to make wire connections will reduce the potential for voltage spikes and line failure. Borough staff with input from the Public Works Department is in the process of securing a company to trim trees from the electric lines. Utilizing the best practices of other utility companies such as PPL & PECO, the tree trimming contract should reduce the risk of outages due to branches contacting power lines.

The Borough also has experienced faults and lock outs by PPL. Due to travel time there is a delay in response to outages from PPL. Once a PPL service operations line incident is recognized the utility must verify the integrity of the system prior to re-energizing. Visual inspections must be made by a PPL employee to verify the service line is safe to energize. Borough Council has directed staff to develop a maintenance plan that will directly improve the electric operation. Please access the Borough's Facebook & Twitter accounts for updates. Registering at ReadyMontco (see page 4) will allow residents and business owners to receive text messages or email updates during power outages, as well as current information on storm related issues such as street flooding or blocked roadways due to fallen tree limbs.

One of the first things you can do is sign up at www.readymontco.org. It will redirect you to the Everbridge Notification System. This program delivers alerts about severe weather and other important events in Montgomery County to the devices of your choice. Whether you prefer emails, text messages, or even a good ol' fashioned phone call - you decide the option that works for you!

There is no direct cost to sign up for ReadyMontco. However, there may be charges for certain features (like receiving text messages) so it's best to double check with your service providers.

ReadyMontco replaced the ReadyNotifyPA system in June 2015 as the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety, along with its emergency management partners in the Southeastern Pennsylvania region, switched providers of our notification system.

Important Information

Outdoor Open Burning

- 1. Except as specifically authorized by the ordinance or permitted by the Borough Fire Marshall in writing, no person shall cause, allow, permit or maintain an outdoor bonfire or open burning on a public or private street or right of way or on public or private property.
- 2. All burning, or open burning of the following is specifically prohibited:
 - A. Garbage
 - B. Household, business, or industrial trash or similar waste products of every kind or nature.
 - C. Loose leaves or yard trimmings.
 - D. Burning or open burning that results in unreasonable quantities of dense smoke, noxious fumes, gas, soot or cinders.
 - E. Open burning that violates the provisions of the International Fire Code as adopted by Hatfield Borough.
 - F. Burning of material that is required to be recycled under Pennsylvania law.
- *Please refer to Chapter 7 of the Borough of Hatfield Code of Ordinances for the entire overview of the law.

Vegetation

No person, firm, or corporation, owning or occupying any property within the Borough shall permit any grass or weeds or any vegetation whatsoever, not edible or planted for some useful ornamental purpose, to grow or remain upon such premises so as to exceed a height of 6 inches or to throw off any unpleasant or noxious odor or to conceal any filthy deposit or to create or produce pollen.

Trees

Ordinance #224 states that it shall be the duty of the owners of real estate in the Borough to trim and maintain trees located on their property and along or near any street in the Borough.

STORM WATER

What is Storm Water?

Storm Water is water from precipitation that flows across the ground and pavement when it rains or when the snow and ice melt. The water seeps in to the ground or drains into what are commonly called storm sewers. These are the drains that you see at street corners or at low points on the sides of streets. Collectively, the draining water is called storm water runoff.

Why is it important for us to keep Storm Water clean?

Our water is as old as the earth. It moves through different forms of solids, vapors and liquids, but remains here for us to use and enjoy. It does not increase or decrease. It moves through the water cycle. We must keep it clean so we can enjoy it by having clean water to drink, for recreation, to use, to support habitat for wildlife, and to allow aquatic life to survive. As we go through our daily life we sometimes overlook all the ways we contaminate our waters. Being conscious of the decisions we make is the first step to clean water. Storm Water runoff can be a problem. Storm Water picks up contaminates as it runs over the surfaces it contacts. Storm Water can pick up things such as:

- Pesticides and fertilizer when it runs over treated grass,
- Pollutants and chemicals when it runs over solid surfaces called impervious areas such as roof tops, driveways, parking lots, roads, and more,
- Household hazardous waste such as cleaners and paint solvents, motor oil and other auto fluids and chemicals when dumped on the ground or in storm drains.
- Sediment when it runs over dirt also referred to as disturbed or un-stabilized areas,
- Trash and debris when heavy rains occur.

56 CITIES

- -4 classes, based on population
- -Most are 3rd class except Philadelphia, Pittsburgh & Scranton
- -Tend to have strong Mayor, centralized Government
- -Some have "home rule"
- -Others use Third Class City Code

959 BOROUGHS

- -No classes based on population
- -Governed by Council & Mayor
- -Council holds most power
- -Follow Borough Code

-9 classes, based on population-Most governed by 3 Commissioners-8 have "home rule"
