## IMPORTANT UPDATES

#### BOROUGH COUNCIL UPDATE

The COVID-19 has made a substantial impact on our country, state, county and local governments. The Borough of Hatfield, its residents and businesses are no exception to the ramifications of this pandemic. Being the essential source of electricity, sanitary sewer service, snow and ice removal just to name a few services, Borough staff has had to deal with the realities of the COVID-19 Health Emergency. Borough Council has been faced with many difficult decisions as well. Dealing with an anticipated \$ 360,000 revenue short fall in 2020 was the first hurdle. Moving projects to the 2021 calendar year was necessary to reduce spending. During preparations for the 2021 fiscal year, it became apparent that Hatfield Borough would need to trim discretionary spending and to increase revenues to adopt a balanced 2021 Budget. Facing this difficult decision Borough Council took a multi-faceted approach to the impending shortfall. Reducing expenditures with minimal increases to revenues was the final result.

Real Estate Tax Increase of .25mils plus the current 1.75mils equals 2.00mils for the Borough General Fund and .25mils for the Hatfield Volunteer Fire Company. Based on the County Assessed Valuation of the Borough, the average assessed property value of \$147,379.50 would increase Real Estate taxes approximately \$36.85 annually per house hold.

<u>Electric Customer Charge Increased</u> from, \$ 8.82 to \$ 12.00 per meter per month would amount to a \$ 38.16 annual increase

<u>Sewer Base Rate Increase</u> of 5.00 per EDU per quarter would amount to a \$ 20.00 annual increase. Total impact to the average home owner in the Borough would be \$ 95.01 annually.

#### 2021 PROJECT UPDATES

The 2021 ADA Curb and Ramp Project was authorized for advertisement at the January 6<sup>th</sup> Borough Council meeting. The Lincoln Avenue Bridge Replacement Project was authorized for advertisement at the January 20<sup>th</sup> Borough Council meeting. The 2021 Roadway Resurfacing Project is scheduled for consideration at the February 3<sup>rd</sup> Borough Council meeting. The AMI meter replacement project is currently being delayed due to meter production. Once all the meters are on site the Borough can coordinate installation of the remaining electric meters. The Behind the Meter Electric Generator Agreement between the Borough of Hatfield and AMP (American Municipal Power) is in the final stage of construction design. The project is scheduled to be operational in the fourth quarter of 2021. Borough Council welcomes any questions on projects during regularly scheduled meetings.

# <u>UTILITY UPDATE</u> Hatfield Borough now has CentraVu!

The Borough of Hatfield is proud to introduce CentraVu, a customer utility portal designed to give our customers access to a dashboard of information to manage both their utility account and usage. Data is fed to the dashboard in real-time. This portal will give customers the reporting and analytic tools needed to not just view their consumption, but truly understand how their behavior affects consumption. Customers can analyze, compare, and download their usage history, see how events such as installing a heat pump or running A/C affect consumption, and set up usage notifications to help achieve their energy conservation goals. ## **PUBLIC POWER**



Public power utilities are community-owned and locally controlled and operated.

Pennsylvania's 35 boroughs providing public power serve 81,492 electric customers and 166,496 residents.









#### Accountability

Public power utilities are the only power providers fully accountable to customers and focused on serving the local community.

Customers have more say in policies and practices of public power utilities as they are managed locally and subject to public processes. Business is conducted in open meetings and adheres to public records laws.

#### **Community Investment**

Much of the of revenue generated by electricity sales is reinvested in the communities through contributions that sustain police, fire and EMS services; support local libraries and parks; and help fund community infrastructure projects.

These investments ease the burden on taxpayers. When all taxes and contributions are considered, the American Public Power Association found that public power contributes 33% more than investor-owned

#### Affordability

The revenue generated by electricity sales help keep property taxes lower.

Property tax rates in boroughs with electric utilities are 43% lower than other boroughs in Pennsylvania.

Access to tax-exempt municipal bonds can save a public power utility 25% over the 30-year life of a project.

### Efficiency

Public power utilities offer operational efficiencies at the local level.

Activities that overlap with municipal services can be streamlined so that administrative services are leaner. Whether it's shared office space and personnel or lower per-person administrative costs for employee benefits, these efficiencies benefit the community at-large.

The average outage time is only 13 minutes for non-major outage events and 42 minutes for major outages, a response time that is significantly shorter than with investor-owned utilities.

# What can you do to reduce or prevent storm water pollution?

- Sweep or rake up debris on surfaces
- Place waste in containers for proper disposal
- Use less toxic weed and pest control methods
- Avoid over watering
- Don't dump chemicals or oil down the storm drain
- Properly maintain your pool and spa
- Don't drain unless absolutely necessary
- Check local regulations when draining
- Use a full or self-service car wash that recycles water

Happy New Year! Hope this finds you healthy. I will post my in person hours on your tax bill however they are subject to change due to the Covid19 pandemic and subsequent lockdown. Please call my office with any questions or to schedule an appointment. I will do my best to try to accommodate. You are encouraged to drop your payments in the drop box outside of the borough office or drop them in my payment window inside the office. If you require a stamped receipt enclose your copy and my copy of the bill with your payment and a self addressed stamped envelope. I will mail you your receipt upon payment processing completion. You may also pay online with your credit card or electronic check. See below for payment processing information. To pay on our website go to www.hatfieldborough.com and click payment menu.

Hatfield Borough also offers the convenience of accepting MasterCard, Discover, American Express and Visa credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$3.00 for bills less than \$113.00. Bills over \$113.01 will have a fee of 2.65% attached to their total. Stop by my office on tax collection days printed on your bill or schedule an appointment. Additionally, you have the flexibility to go online to use your MasterCard, Discover Card, American Express or Visa.









#### **Electronic Check Payments**

<u>Hatfield Borough now accepts electronic check payments using our online payment service.</u> Payments will be charged to your checking or savings account at your bank. You will need your 9-digit routing number, as well as your account number from your personal checks (see example below). A per transaction service fee of \$1.50 will be charged by the payment processing company for this service.
