

The approved 2023 operating budget of 9.6 million reflects **NO INCREASE to the 3.25mil REAL ESTATE TAX that includes the FIRE TAX.** The 2023 Budget includes a revenue increase in the customer charge for electric and EDU charge for sewer utilities which is projected to generate an additional \$85,000.00 a year in revenue for the Borough.

Despite rising costs in services, insurance property liability, worker's compensation, and health care coverage, the Borough is committed to moving forward with planned infrastructure projects including ADA improvements, roadway resurfacing, utility replacement projects, and upgrades to electric, sanitary sewer, and stormwater systems.







# **Traffic Study Updates**

### Speed Study Results Are In

During the third week of September, Hatfield Police conducted speed studies along both West Vine Street and West Broad Street, two roads that are most often the source of speeding complaints.

For West Vine Street, the average speed for eastbound traffic was 26.94 mph and the average speed for westbound traffic was 28.67 mph. On West Broad Street near the Wayne Avenue intersection, the average speed westbound was 25.45 mph and the average speed eastbound was 24.74 mph. As all our Borough roadways are posted at 25 mph, these numbers show that, overall, drivers are obeying the posted traffic control signs.

#### West Vine Street speed ranges:

### Speed Study Results Are In

During the first guarter of 2023, the Hatfield Township Police Department conducted two traffic studies along roadways that were the source of speeding and other motor vehicle complaints. All borough roadways are designated as 25 mph zones.

#### Towamencin Avenue speed ranges:

#### Between January 27 and February 15, traffic was monitored in the 300 block of Towamencin Avenue. A total of 31,496 vehicles were recorded during this time.

Regarding traffic traveling northbound towards Forty Foot Road, there were 11,451 vehicles recorded, and of that number, 76 vehicles - or .7% - were in excess of 40 mph. The highest recorded speed was 54 mph. The average speed was 24 mph. The V85 speed, or the 85th percentile speed, is the speed that 85% of drivers do not exceed, and 15% of the drivers do exceed, and this study's V85 speed was 29 mph for northbound traffic.

For traffic proceeding towards South Main Street, there were 20,045 vehicles monitored. Of those 20,045, 475 vehicles - or 2.36% - were in excess of 40 mph. The highest recorded speed was 78 mph, the average speed was 27 mph, and the V85 for traffic in this direction was 34 mph.

It was noted that the visibility of the speed sign display coincided with those headed northbound towards Forty Foot Road, which may have contributed to the fact the motorists headed in this direction were more mindful of the designated speed limit.

The statistics along this roadway indicate that officers should continue targeted enforcement efforts through the practice of selective enforcements and during general patrol.

#### Blaine Avenue speed ranges:

Between February 15 and March 10, a traffic study was performed on Blaine Avenue, a one-way street within the borough. During this time frame, 1,130 vehicles were recorded.

No motorists proceeded over 40 mph, only one vehicle was recorded at 39 mph, and only two vehicles were between 30 and 38 mph. The average speed of vehicles traveling along Blaine Avenue was 16 mph, and the V85 was 20 mph.

These statistics show that motorists along Blaine Avenue are not only heedful of the speed limit, but most are also traveling well under the 25 mph limit.



#### ReadyMontco: Frequently Asked Questions

#### What is ReadyMontco?

ReadyMontco is a mass notification system that allows you to receive emergency and community notifications via your preferred delivery method for locations you are interested in. These locations can include your home, work place, school, or those same locations for family members or loved ones.

#### How does ReadyMontco work?

When you set up your account, you choose the way you want to get notifications. In an emergency, ReadyMontco will send a notification to the devices and emails attached to your account in the order you have chosen. Read these messages right away and follow the instructions. More instructions may be sent during the emergency, so keep your devices near you.

#### Sign up for Notifications

Are you READY to begin? If so, click <u>Here</u> or **Sign Up** at the top of the page. <u>Here's a short video</u> that walks you through the registration process. You will be prompted to enter basic contact information, including your name, addresses (home, office, school, home of a loved one, etc), and paths through which we can contact you, such as email, text messaging, voice calling, and/or TTY/TTD. If you have a smart phone, be sure to download Everbridge Mobile Member from the App Store on your iPhone or Android.

ReadyMontco only sends alerts specific to Montgomery County. Therefore, the address you provide must be located within Montgomery County. Be sure to confirm geo-location of your address on the map pop up window to ensure that weather alerts are specific to your address. If you believe that your address of interest is located within Montgomery County and still have difficulty with registration, please send an email to <a href="mailto:everbridgesupport@montcopa.org">everbridgesupport@montcopa.org</a>

The registration process also contains a **My Information** tab. If you, a family member, or someone you live with have an Access or Functional Need and will need assistance during an emergency, this page is especially important! It is up to each municipality to determine how they wish to utilize this information, and while it is not a promise of specialized service, it is our goal to use the information you provide to plan for disasters and other emergencies.
