

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#### 1) Introduction

Eight municipalities in Montgomery County collaborated with the PA Environmental Council and consulting firm, Michael Baker International, to advance the planning of the Liberty Bell Trail (LBT). Those municipalities include Upper Gwynedd Township, North Wales Borough, Lansdale Borough, Hatfield Township, Hatfield Borough, Franconia Township, Souderton Borough and Telford Borough. A prior LBT Feasibility Study completed in 2005 investigated the potential development of the former 25-mile Liberty Bell Trolley route between Norristown to Quakertown into a shared use path network for walking and bicycling.

This feasibility study provides an update to the 11-mile portion of the LBT in Montgomery County. In the last 17 years, some progress has been made towards its completion including construction of approximately 1.5 miles in Lansdale Borough and another 0.5 mile in Hatfield Borough. As part of this trail update, we investigated changes that have occurred along the planned trail route, explored alternatives, and made recommendations for a preferred trail route. These technical tasks were supported by a robust public



#### **Background on the Past Trolley Line:**

The LBT generally follows the alignment of the Lehigh Valley Transit Company's Philadelphia Division, which was known as the Liberty Bell Route. Constructed in stages between 1900 and 1913, electric railway service was abandoned in 1951. Portions of the electric railway alignment survive as power line rights-of-way with an earth-surface maintenance road where the rails and ties had been. Straightforward rail-to-trail conversions are possible for some portions of the LBT. However, long stretches of its namesake trolley line were never implemented "railroad style," running instead in the shoulders of highways and in the centers of streets, neither of which are suitable as trail alignments. In those locations where rail-to-trail conversions will not be possible, alternate trail alignments will need to be established.

Portion of the Lehigh Valley Transit Co. network map which included the Liberty Bell Trolley route between Norristown and Quakertown.





- Final Report and Executive Summary


## 3) Regional Context

The Liberty Bell Trail is planned to be part of the larger 800+ mile Circuit Trail network that serves the greater Philadelphia region. The Circuit helps connect southeast Pennsylvania and New Jersey's suburban, urban and rural communities with an alternative transportation system. It also creates numerous opportunities for recreation and access to the region's beautiful natural areas and waterways. The map on the following page shows how the proposed LBT will fit into the overall Circuit network and how the LBT will connect numerous communities in central Montgomery County and will make a vital connection to Bucks County. The LBT will also enhance access to the Wissahickon Green Ribbon Trail, open space properties, nature preserves and connect to many municipal parks/trails. The LBT could also connect to Upper Gwynedd's proposed Powerline Trail.



Line map of the 800+ mile Circuit Trail Network in the Philadelphia Regional Area.








#### Wissahickon Green Ribbon Trail:





The Wissahickon Green Ribbon Trail (<a href="https://wissahickontrails.org/">https://wissahickontrails.org/</a>) is a 12.5-mile walking trail the runs from Lansdale to Fairmount Park in Philadelphia and contains many attractions including, but not limited to parks, historical sites, and preserved areas. The network also includes twelve nature areas with an additional 12 miles of walking/hiking paths. The LBT will is planned to connect to the Green Ribbon Trail at the south end of Parkside Place Park.



#### Powerline Trail:

Upper Gwynedd Township is also currently advancing a feasibility study for the proposed Powerline Trail. That multi-use path is planned to extend for over 6 miles from the 202 Parkway Trail to Morris Road. The proposed Powerline Trail alignment overlaps with the LBT in the area of Parkside Place Park creating a great opportunity for a more interconnected trail network.






## 3) Public Participation Program

Our team completed a comprehensive outreach program across many different meetings and formats to maximize public feedback to the study including:

**Wiki Maps Website**: An initial wikimap website of the study corridor was created to allow the public to identify obstacles and opportunities with the project area. The results of the wikimap informed the alternatives analysis process. In addition, the proposed alignments were added to the wikimap later in the study to gain feedback from the community on the various alternatives. This information was used to refine the proposed trail locations and contribute to selection of the preferred location.



**Formal Open House Meetings**: Traditional open house style meetings were help at the midpoint of the study to allow the community to view the alternatives and provide comments directly to the study team and the municipal officials. To provide more focused outreach, the study area was divided into 3 Segments – South, Central, North. The meetings were held as follows:

- South Segment Meeting for Upper Gwynedd Twp, North Wales Borough and Lansdale Borough held at Upper Gwynedd Township on 10/7/21
- Central Segment Meeting for Hatfield Borough and Hatfield Township held at Hatfield Township on 9/26/21
- North Segment Meeting for Franconia Twp., Souderton Borough and Telford Borough held at Souderton Borough on 10/13/21

**Community Survey** – A brief community survey was prepared, and attendees completed the survey at each of the public meetings.





The sign sheets, community survey and comments received from each meeting are in the appendix.

**Pop-Up Outreach at Community Events** -The study team had tables at three public community events to expand the audience for public outreach about the study. The events were as follows:

**Virtual Public Meeting Room** – Michael Baker was created a custom virtual public meeting room website that was used in parallel with the in-person meetings to enhance the opportunity for the public to provide feedback for the study. A QR code was created to allow easy access to the meeting site. The site also included a public survey as well.



All these outreach opportunities were advertised on the 8 municipalities websites, social media channels and newsletters. In addition, PEC conducted several meetings with community stakeholders and business members to expand the reach of the public engagement and acquire feedback from another important user group for the trail.

#### **Municipal Staff Interviews:**

To further our teams understanding of the corridor and the potential for trail development, interviews were held with 10 key municipal staff members. The following questions were asked of each person:

- On a scale of 1 to 10, how supportive is the community of local trails? What are the most popular activities associated with the trails?
- Does your community have on-road bike infrastructure? Are community members comfortable using it?
- Please provide a brief overview of the municipality's previous work on the Liberty Bell Trail and/or Liberty Bell Trail related projects.
- What priorities does the municipality carry over from the 2005 Feasibility Study? What has changed?
- Are you aware of any sections of the former Liberty Bell Trolley line that still exist?
- What are the biggest opportunity areas for the Liberty Bell Trail in your municipality?
- What are the biggest challenges and/or areas of concern?
- What is the most exciting aspect of this process for the municipality?





- What is the level of support from political leadership for the trail?
- As we review key organizations/partners to engage in stakeholder interviews and other engagement efforts who from your community should be involved?
- Anything you would like to add that we haven't discussed?

The compiled answers from the interviews were integrated into the alignment alternative analysis and are included in the Appendix.

## **LBT MontCo Study Advisory Committee Meeting Summary:**

In addition to the monthly Steering Committee meetings, comprised of representatives from each of the eight municipalities involved in/affected by this feasibility study, a member of the Montgomery County Planning Commission, and the Executive Director of the Partnership TMA of Montgomery County, the Pennsylvania Environmental Council (PEC), as part of the project team, created a Study Advisory Committee (SAC) of local community members/leaders, business owners, concerned citizens, and representatives from local school boards, YMCAs, libraries, and the like. PEC coordinated three meetings of the SAC throughout the course of this project, as outlined below.

#### SAC Meeting #1 - Wednesday, June 23rd, 2021 from 10-11 am

The first SAC meeting was focused on introducing SAC members to each other, as well as project team member Zhenya Nalywayko, PEC Trails & Recreation Program Coordinator, to the SAC members. This meeting was also focused on outlining to the SAC members the goals, structure, and rough timeline of the feasibility study that had just kicked off.

Zhenya provided an overview of the history of the Liberty Bell Trail (LBT) corridor, explained the need for an updated feasibility study, and informed SAC members that they would become ambassadors for the LBT. This would mean they would help the project team spread awareness about the feasibility study and upcoming public meetings and events, build support for the project in their communities, and take part in project-related meetings, surveys, etc.

Zhenya then outlined when the first public meetings would be, what they would be focused on, and informed the group that there would be another SAC meeting shortly before the first round of public meetings.



#### SAC Meeting #2 - Wednesday, September 8th, 2021 from 12-1 pm

At the second SAC meeting, Zhenya provided a recap of all feasibility study efforts to date, including:

- The planned public meetings and events
  - O This included a review of the format of the public meetings and a call for any related feedback
- A review of the initial alignments for the LBT and a call for any related feedback
- A review of what SAC members could do to raise awareness about the upcoming public meetings and events, in addition to showing up themselves
- A reminder to check out and provide feedback on the online public meeting room

Zhenya then reminded everyone that their attendance at the public meetings and events was highly encouraged and appreciated, and that there would be another SAC meeting closer to the end of the feasibility study process.

#### SAC Meeting #3 – Monday, March 7th, 2022 from 2-3 pm

At the third and final SAC meeting, Zhenya walked the SAC members through the draft Liberty Bell Trail feasibility study, focusing mostly on the seven (7) priority sections between Upper Gwynedd Township and Telford Borough.

Zhenya explained the context and details associated with each priority section, including opportunities and challenges along each corridor, initial cost estimates, and potential grant and funding sources to get these sections built. This included an overview of next steps for the eight municipalities involved, specifically: adopting a resolution recognizing the feasibility study and committing to implementing its recommendations and applying for funding to get their respective sections built.

Zhenya ended the meeting by reminding SAC members that the process of getting the LBT built will never be finished. It is up to each member of the SAC to continue building support for the LBT in their communities, and to keep pushing their elected officials to move priority sections forward.



## 4) Trail Alternatives Development and Analysis

Analysis of aerial photography, background research and field views were conducted to determine the major terrain features, adjacent property uses and environmental issues that would affect the construction of this trail facility. The corridor was evaluated to determine the most appropriate trail facility and most feasible approach for its construction. According to AASHTO's <u>Guide for the Development of Bicycle Facilities</u>, there are 4 different types of bicycle facilities. The selection of the facility should be based on factors such as the ability of the users, specific corridor conditions, and facility cost. The different types are the following:

Shared Roadway (No Bikeway Designation): This facility represents the majority of existing bicycle travel in the United States. Some street systems provide efficient bicycle travel and do not require the use of additional signing and striping. In other instances, it would be inappropriate to designate a certain route a bikeway because the roadways are not suitable for bicycling. In some cases, such as residential areas, the bicycle demand is not high enough to warrant a bikeway designation. Rural highways that are used for intercity and recreational travel should only be designated as a bikeway where there is a need for enhanced continuity with other bicycle routes.

**Signed/Marked Shared Roadway:** This facility is designated by bike route signs, Bikes May Use Full Lane signs and/or shared lane markings (i.e. sharrows) along an existing roadway and has two purposes. One purpose is to provide continuity to other bicycle facilities, such as bike lanes. Another purpose is to designate preferred routes through high-demand corridors. These routes are implied to be more advantageous than alternate routes to bicyclists. Therefore, responsible agencies should ensure that these routes are adequate and well maintained for the needs of bicyclists. The special signing and pavement markings also makes drivers aware of the presence of bicyclists.

As indicated in the NAACTO guide, shared lane markings (SLMs), or "sharrows," are road markings used to indicate a shared lane environment for bicycles and automobiles. Among other benefits shared lane markings reinforce the legitimacy of bicycle traffic on the street, recommend proper bicyclist positioning, and may be configured to offer directional and wayfinding guidance. The shared lane marking is a pavement marking with a variety of uses to support a complete bikeway network; it is not a facility type and should not be considered a substitute for bike lanes, cycle tracks, or other separation treatments where these types of facilities are otherwise warranted or space permits. The MUTCD outlines guidance for shared lane markings in section 9C.07.

### **Bicycle Boulevards:**

A Bicycle Boulevard is a road or street that is ideal for bicyclist transport through specialized road treatment such as traffic calming and speed reduction, way finding signage and pavement markings, and intersection crossing treatments. The following identifies some of the specific treatments that can be used to create bicycle boulevards:





A combination of the above treatments is often utilized to enhance the use of specific roadways as bicycle boulevards. The above treatments are typically used on a regular interval along a number of blocks of a roadway corridor to as shown in the figures below.

**Bicycle Lane:** This facility's purpose is to enhance conditions for bicyclists on the streets through the use of appropriate pavement markings and signing. Bike lanes are used in areas where there is both a high bicycle demand and distinct needs that can be served by using them. Bike lanes delineate the right-of-way for bicyclists and motorists, separating the traffic and increasing the capacity of highways with mixed traffic. Bike lanes also provide an adequate area for bicyclists where there is insufficient space on the roadway for comfortable riding. For effective bike lanes, bicycle-safe drainage inlet grates should be used, pavement surfaces should be smooth, and traffic signals should be responsive to bicyclists. Regular maintenance should be a top priority to ensure potholes, broken glass, debris, or other impediments do not interfere with the bicyclists.

**Shared Use Path:** This facility consists of any independent trail on a separate alignment specifically designed for pedestrians and bicyclists. Shared use paths (SUP) are often constructed along rivers, ocean fronts, canals, utility rights-of-way, former or active railroad rights-of-way, within college campuses, within and between parks, or as part

of a planned development. Shared use paths offer opportunities not provided by road systems, such as recreation or a direct commute. A shared use path is designed with the safety of all users in mind. This includes bicyclists, joggers, pedestrians, dog walkers, people with baby strollers, people with disabilities, roller bladders, etc.

It is important that the proposed facility does not encourage or require bicyclists or motorists to operate in a manner that is different from the rules of the road. The needs of both bicyclists and motorists must be considered in the selection of the facility. Continuity of the overall system should be taken into consideration in the selection of the facility. Alternating segments of shared use path and bike lanes may result in street

crossings at the end of the segments or wrong-way bicycle travel beyond the limits of the path due to the inconvenience of crossing the street. Sidewalks should be used in limited circumstances, such as along bridges or in areas of sporadic bicycle use. Any considerable difference in height between the sidewalk and roadway should be protected by a suitable barrier.



Bicycle/Pedestrian Bridges and Crossings: Crossings of waterways, roadways and other obstacles can be some of the most difficult and costly portions of a trail project due to design, permitting and construction issues. Crossings of waterways can be complicated by the need for various types of permits from state Departments of Environmental Protection or other agencies. These permits can vary from a minor application showing a sketch of the crossing to permits that required in-depth hydraulic models, reports and coordination with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to determine flood plain impacts. The following are several methods that are typically used on trail projects for waterway crossings: ford, low flow pipe culverts, metal/concrete box or arch culvert, pre-fabricated bridge (various materials) and custom designed bridge.

#### **Trail Alternative Analysis:**

We analyzed the existing conditions and developed proposed trail alignments for the various communities within the study area. The following discussion outlines the major challenges and opportunities for each location. The discussion will cover the right of way/property impacts, environmental constraints, connectivity to the larger bike/pedestrian network, utility conflicts, construction challenges and Implementation Strategies. Section 1 – Upper Gwynedd Township


Begin/End – Parkside Place Park to Stony Creek Park

Length – 2.3 miles

Percent Off Road / On Road – 100% off road, shared use path meeting Circuit Trail Standards

**Description**: The trail will start at Parkside Place Park. There are several trails in this municipal park and several sidewalks that could be widened to serve as shared use paths. The existing signalized intersection of Parkside Place/Sumneytown Pike already has pedestrian pushbuttons, crosswalks and hand/man indications that will allow safe trail crossings. The trail will follow the north side of Sumneytown pike from Parkside Place to Dickerson Drive. The existing sidewalk will be widened to serve as an 8'-10' wide trail. The trail will follow the west side of Dickerson Drive by widening/replacing the existing sidewalk with a trail up to Wissahickon Avenue. A number of commercial driveways will be improved with crosswalks and warning signage will be needed along Dickerson Drive. The trail will follow the south side of Wissahickon Avenue and use the existing sidewalk on the Wissahickon Avenue bridge over the Wissahickon Creek to cross over this waterway. To the west of the Wissahickon Creek bridge, a mid-block crossing will be installed. Then the trail will follow the north side of Wissahickon Avenue up to Church Road. A number of commercial driveways will be improved with crosswalks and warning signage will be needed along Wissahickon Avenue. Approaching Church Road, the existing 5'-6'sidewalks will be widened to 10' to accommodate walkers and bicyclists. At the Church Road/Wissahickon Ave intersection, crosswalks and ped push buttons are present but countdown timers and ADA ramp upgrades would improve this local for the trail. The trail will cross over Church Road and continue along the north side of Pennbrook Parkway outside the curb line with a 5' buffer and 8'-10' shared use path. There is at least one stormwater basin and on potential wetland area along this roadway. If that becomes an issue for the trail construction, we recommend a short section of shared lane markings (i.e. sharrows) be added in that area and the use of the existing sidewalk. This segment of trail will connect to the existing Liberty

**Right of Way / Property Effects**: All the roads involved with this section are owned by Montgomery County or Upper Gwynedd Township. Minor signage and landscaping modifications needed on Dickerson Road. The following properties are adjacent to the proposed trail and may require easements:

**Environmental Constraints**: Stormwater basin/wetlands along Pennbrook Parkway.

**Bicycle/Pedestrian Connectivity**: This trail will provide enhanced access to Parkside Place Park and Dodsworth Run Preserve. It connects to the existing LBT Trail at Stony Creek Park. It connects to many existing sidewalks. The existing Green Ribbon Trail connects to Parkside Place Park as well. This section of the LBT could also connect to the proposed Powerline Trail. A spur connection to North Wales Borough using the Center Street connector trail will be an important connection for Borough residents to the LBT.

**Utility Impacts**: Several guy wires to existing utility poles man need sidewalk bars to provide safe clearance to the trail. Minor relocation/adjusts of a few manholes and fire hydrants may be needed.

**Construction Challenges**: They are few construction challenges in this section.

**Implementation Strategies**: Review road right of ways and land development plans in detail to confirm areas where the existing sidewalks can be widened, or shared use path constructed within existing road right of way. Expand existing sidewalk along the frontage of Dodsworth Run Preserve



Section 2 - Lansdale Borough

Begin/End - Railroad Street/Main Street (Existing Trail) to Wedgewood Park/Tremont Drive

Length - 1.75 miles

Percent Off Road / On Road – 0.75 miles (43%) on road using shared lane markings and 1.0 mile (57%) off road, shared use path meeting Circuit Trail Standards

**Description**: There is an existing portion of the LBT from Stony Creek Park to the intersection of Railroad Street/Main Street. The proposed Section 2 will cross over Main Street at the existing crosswalk at Green Street/Madison Street. The existing sidewalk along Main Street will be used up to


Walnut Street. Shared lane markings with existing sidewalks will be used along Walnut Street from Main Street to 9<sup>th</sup> Street. A new shared use path is envisioned along the north side of 9<sup>th</sup> Street in the green space up to Kenilworth Avenue. A proposed trail will be built by a new development from Kenilworth Avenue to Moyer Road. The trail will cross over to the west side of Moyer and the existing sidewalk along Moyer Road will be widened/replaced into a trail for a short distance to reach Moyer's Road Park. The trail will wind through the baseball fields and playground areas in Moyer's Road Park and Wedgewood Park and ending at Tremont Drive.

**Spur connections:** We recommend two spur trail connections to this section of the LBT. One spur is recommended along Walnut Street up to a paper street opposite Medical Campus Drive. Sharrows and proposed sidewalk are proposed along Walnut Street up to the paper street. A proposed shared use path is proposed within the paper street up to the existing traffic signal at Broad Street. The existing crosswalks and pedestrian push buttons can be used to connect to Jefferson Lansdale Hospital and other businesses along Broad Street. The second spur trail is recommended along Moyers Road up to Schweiker Park.

**Right of Way / Property Effects**: Bikeway easements may be needed along Moyers Road depending on existing road right of way and limits of the trail constructed as part of the proposed development between the 9<sup>th</sup> Street SEPTA station and Moyers Road. The rest of the trail will be on Lansdale Borough property between Moyers Road and Tremont Drive.

**Environmental Constraints**: No environmental constraints are anticipated in this section.

**Bicycle/Pedestrian Connectivity**: A connection to the Lansdale SEPTA station and the 9<sup>th</sup> Street SEPTA station are key links to the larger transportation network. Connections to the existing trail at Railroad Street is a key element of this section. A spur trail along Moyer Avenue to Schweiker Park would be a valuable addition to the network.

**Utility Impacts:** No major utility conflicts are anticipated.

**Construction Challenges**: No major construction challenges are anticipated in this section.

Implementation Strategies: Lansdale Borough was awarded a TASA Grant in Jan 2022 for construction of the section of trail from 9<sup>th</sup> Street/Moyers Road to Tremont Drive. This section will be complete in the next 2-3 years. Maximize trail construction by private developer at the North Penn Business Park. Install sharrows and LBT signage along Walnut Street since this would be within the existing road right of way.

Section 3 – Hatfield Township

Begin/End – Wedgewood Park/Tremont Drive to Vine Street (Existing LBT)

Length – 1.2 miles

Percent Off Road / On Road – 100% off road, shared use path meeting Circuit Trail Standards


Description: This section would begin at Wedgwood Park/Tremont Drive just over the border of Lansdale Borough. The trail would run through a wooded parcel owned partially by Lansdale Borough and a private owner out to Schwab Road. The trail will extend outside the roadway as an 8'-10' wide shared use path on the south side of Schwab Road up to West Orvilla Road. Due to the narrow width of the Schwab Road bridge over the East Branch of the Neshaminy Creek, a new trail bridge is anticipated adjacent to the roadway bridge. There are two large industrial/warehouse businesses in this stretch that will reach upgrades at their driveways with crosswalks and warning signage to accommodate the trail. There is one residential home relatively close to the roadway that may be a challenge for trail development. This route will also cross the PA Northeastern Railroad so the existing at-grade railroad road crossing with Schwab Road will have to be modified and expanded to accommodate the trail. That area will require several hundred feet of drainage improvements due to roadside swales and existing pipe crossings under the railroad. The crossing of Orville Road may require a Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon to enhance safety on this 40-mph road with higher traffic volumes. It is anticipated that the trail will parallel the railroad but be located underneath the existing electric transmission lines in a parcel which is owned by PPL Electric Company. The trail will continue from Orvilla Road to West Vine Street in this parcel. PPL has granted Hatfield Borough an easement for a portion of the existing LBT so it is anticipated another easement will be acquired for this portion of the trail in Hatfield Township. A proposed development is under review at the Didden Greenhouse parcel which is also located adjacent to the railroad in this area. The Township is in discussions with the developer to include the trail or a trail easement in their development plans.




Percent Off Road / On Road – 0.05 mi (4%) on road shared lane markings or use of sidewalk, 1.4 miles (96%) off road, shared use path meeting **Circuit Trail Standards** 

**Description**: This section would begin where the existing section of the Liberty Bell Trail ends at East Broad Street. Bicyclists will either walk their bikes on the sidewalk with pedestrians on East Broad Street or share the road for approximately 300' up to the intersection of East Broad Street/East Lincoln Avenue. the existing crosswalk at East Broad Street/Cherry Lane will be used to make the transition from the sidewalk to sharrows. An existing crosswalk will be used to cross East Lincoln Ave to former railroad station property. It is our understanding that Hatfield Borough is leasing this property and aims to convert the former station building into a restaurant or other commercial use. The trail will cross several properties parallel to the PA Northeastern Railroad including the Hatfield Volunteer Fire Company. The trail will cross Union Street and Penn Street to reach the north side of Penn Street. This is a somewhat complex intersection with the nearby railroad crossing and sharp curve on Union Street so a rectangular rapid flashing beacon, signs with embedded LEDs or other higher level warning device is recommended. On the north side of Penn Avenue, there are several commercial and industrial uses with large front yard setbacks to the buildings and little or no residential homes. This route is anticipated to have less push back from these adjacent property View of the existing Liberty Bell Trail in Hatfield Borough from Main Street looking south. owners. Sidewalk widening is envisioned for the first 600' and then a typical



side path trail with a 5' minimum grass buffer and 10' wide shared use path is proposed. Relocation of a hedge row and the stone entrance columns at the Hatfield Cemetery is proposed to create space for the shared use path. A trail bridge is anticipated to span over the outlet structure at the pond on the Americold property adjacent to Penn Avenue. Minor signal modifications and crosswalks may be needed at the signalized intersection of Bergey Rd/Penn Avenue to more safely allow trail crossings. The trail will then cross the lawn areas of 8 large industrial properties before reaching East Township Line Road. Appropriate pavement marking and signing improvements will be installed at the driveway crossings for these properties.




# Town and Country Trail Routes in Franconia, Souderton and Telford

Two alignment alternatives were identified in the Franconia, Souderton Borough and Telford Borough area. The consensus of the public and the municipal stakeholders was that they would like to advance both options in the future. Both routes end at the Telford Municipal Park. With that input, we have identified the two routes as the "Town and Country" routes as follows:

**Town Route** - This trail alignment generally extends through the more developed downtown sections of Souderton Borough and Telford Borough.

**Country Route** – This trail alignment general runs adjacent to more rural farm fields, opens space parcels, larger and suburban areas within Franconia Township and a portion of the more developed Telford Borough.

#### **Country Route**

Section 5 - Franconia Township

Begin/End – East Township Line Road/Penn Avenue to Souderton Area High School Length – 4.5 miles (includes 1.5 miles of share use path to be construction as part of PennDOT project) Percent Off Road / On Road – 4.5 miles (100%) off road, shared use path meeting Circuit Trail Standards


Description: Starting at the intersection of Penn Avenue/East Township Line Road), the trail will parallel East Township Line Road up to Cowpath Road. This section is anticipated to include a 5′ grass buffer and 10′ wide paved shared use path. As part of PennDOT's 309 Connector project (SR 1058 Section HT2), PennDOT has committed to constructing a shared use path between Cowpath Road and Allentown Road. The trail will continue parallel to Wambold Road on the north side of the roadway up to Schoolhouse Road. It is anticipated that the trail will continue along the east side of Schoolhouse Road to Nice Road. There are several buildings (Hayes Auto Body) close to the roadway as well as one narrow culvert crossing between Nice Road and Souder Road that will make this portion of the trail somewhat challenging to implement. The trail will cross over to the west side of Schoolhouse Road from Nice Road to Souder Road to avoid this pinch point. The trail will cross back to the east side of Schoolhouse continue along the frontage of several agricultural parcels up to Forman Road. Just prior to Forman Road, an existing narrow bridge over Skippack Creek is

present. A separate trail bridge maybe needed until this bridge is reconstructed with a safe area for trail users to cross over the creek. Forman Road is a low volume local road lined by agriculture fields and larger industrial uses. A portion of Forman Road has been widened from approximately 22' wide to approximately 34' wide potentially allowing for the striping of bike lanes on each side if a shared use path is not feasible outside the roadway. The route will follow Forman Road and turn left onto Lower Road. Lower Road provides access to the Souderton Area High School where a side path will parallel the access road around the school complex and connects to Halteman Road at the rear of the school property.

Begin/End –Souderton Area High School to Telford Municipal Park
Length – 4.5 miles (includes 0.4 miles of existing share use path within Franconia Community Park)
Percent Off Road / On Road – 1.1 miles (24%) on road using shared lane markings, 3.5 miles (76%) off road, shared use path or protected bike lanes meeting Circuit Trail Standards

**Description**: Starting at the rear of Souderton Area High School, this section will cross over Halteman Road into an Open Space parcel owned by Franconia Township. The trail will follow the outside edge of the farm fields on the open space parcel and adjacent parcels up to Meeting House Road. The trail will then parallel Meeting House Road up to Route 113. A rectangular rapid flashing beacon or other high visibility crossing mechanism will be installed for the trail crossing of this higher speed and higher volume roadway. The trail is envisioned to parallel the east side of Meeting House Road for approximately 2500' until reaching another Franconia Township Open Space parcel. The trail will follow the south edge of the farm field and through a 50' wide portion of the property that connects to Allentown Road across from Franconia Community Park. A mid-block crossing of Allentown Road will be installed with appropriate signing and pavement markings including the consideration of a RRFB or LED embedded warning signs. A small trail connection will be installed to connect to the existing trail network within the park. The existing park paths will be used to travel through the park to reach Godshall Road. The existing crosswalk on Godshall Road will be improved for the trail crossing to the north side of Godshall Road. The existing sidewalks between the park entrance off Godshall Road and Fairway Drive will be widened or replaced to serve as the 10' wide shared use path. Fairway Drive is a local road with a 25mph posted speed limit and sidewalks on both sides. Sharrows and LBT signs will be added along Fairway Drive to connect the trail




Example photo showing use of lane separator curb (i.e. qwick kurb) to create protected bike lanes along an existing roadway. This could be considered along Church Road.

out to Bergey Road. Existing sidewalk on Bergey Road will be widened/replaced and extending to Indian Creek Road to serve as the trail route. Indian Creek Road is a low volume local road that will be improved with sharrows and LBT signs to serve as the trail route. Sharrows will also be installed along a short section of Cowpath Road between Indian Creek Road and Church Road. Church Road is a 34' wide road that includes sidewalks on the




east side. Although Church Road carries a higher volume of traffic, it is a direct connection to the Telford Municipal Park and the State Road corridor that is anticipated to be the LBT route into Bucks County. See the following pages for two proposed options to modify the roadway to incorporate the LBT. In the area of Centennial Park, the existing parking spots will be maintained, and the trail will shift to the sidewalk location. The existing sidewalk will be widened or replaced to avoid impacts to the parking in that area. The route will continue up to Indian Valley Lane where sharrows will be used with the existing sidewalks through this quiet neighborhood. Lenape Lane will also have sharrows up to the intersection with Main Street. Trail users will use the existing sidewalk up to the intersection of Main Street/Driveway into Landis supermarket. A side path is envisioned to be constructed alongside the supermarket driveway up to North Hamilton Street where the LBT will connect to an existing paved trail into Telford's Municipal Park which is the ending point for this study area.



Map of the second half of the "Country Route" along Section 6 in Franconia Township/Telford Borough. The preferred trail corridor is shown in light blue.







**Environmental Constraints**: No major environmental constraints present.

#### **Bicycle/Pedestrian Connectivity:**

Connection to Souderton Area High School, Franconia Community Park, Centennial Park, Telford Municipal Park, Indian Valley Library and Landis Supermarket. Provides access to two Franconia Open Space Parcels.

#### **Town Route**

Section 7 – Franconia Township /Souderton Borough/Telford Borough

Begin/End –East Township Road/Penn Avenue to Telford Municipal Park

Length – 3.7 miles (includes 2.4 miles of share the road)

Percent Off Road / On Road – 1.3 miles (35%) off road, shared use path meeting Circuit Trail Standards and 2.4 miles (65%) share the road markings with sidewalks

**Description** – Starting at the intersection of East Township Line Road/Penn Avenue, the trail will proceed east along the north side of East Township Line Road up to Souderton Hatfield Pike. The trail will consist of a 5' buffer and 10' shared use path adjacent to the roadway. The path will turn left up Souderton Hatfield Pike and be located on the east side of the roadway. There are a few large industrial/commercial properties with large grass areas in front and less driveways and residential properties on the east side of the roadway. Souderton Borough has acquired the parcel at the southeast corner of Souderton Hatfield Pike/Cherry Lane for the future construction of a new public works building. This will allow the trail to be constructed on that parcel for approximately 600'. Crosswalk and pedestrian countdown timers are recommended at the signalized intersection of Souderton Hatfield Pike/Cherry Lane. The trail will transition to shared lane markings, LBT wayfinding signage and sidewalks along Washington Avenue. A spur connection to the nearby Lawn Avenue Park using wayfinding signage. The LBT will share the road and use sidewalks along Washington Avenue up to the existing signalized intersection with Broad Street. This will bring trail users into the heart of Souderton Borough with access to local businesses, restaurants and attractions. A stop at the newly renovated Broad Movie Theater/Freewill Brewing Taproom will be a required event on many rides! A map kiosk showing the local businesses and services at the northeast corner of the intersection would be a great amenity to direct trail users to all the great things to see and do in downtown Souderton. The existing push buttons and crosswalks will be enhanced with countdown timers and LBT signage for trail users to cross over Broad Street and continue Washington Avenue up to Lumber Street. The trail route will turn left down Lumber Street, which is a less busy parallel street to Broad Street and connect to Wile Avenue. Lumber Street has some sidewalk gaps but parallel streets such as Chestnut Street have continuous sidewalks if a different pedestrian route is preferred. The sharrows, LBT signage and sidewalks will continue along Wile Avenue passing by Chestnut Street playground. Wile Avenue does include a 0.25 mile long relatively steep upgrade from Hillside Avenue to Summit Street that maybe a challenge for some riders. The Borough's Holly's Hill Park is located about halfway up the hill and could be a good location for a rest area with benches. The Souderton Borough Community Park and Souderton Community pool which are the centerpieces of the Borough's park network are located on either side of Wile Avenue near West Reliance Road. The LBT will continue using sharrows, signage and sidewalks up to Harleysville Pike (Route 113). The existing sidewalk will be used for approximately 100' to use the existing traffic signal at Crest Avenue to safely cross Route 113. Crest Avenue is also the entrance to the Indian Crest Middle School and has an existing 4' bituminous path running



parallel to the roadway toward the school. This path would be widened to accommodate the 8'-10' LBT, provide bike/ped access to the school and extend around the school property up to 4th Street. The existing sidewalk would be widened along the west side of 4th Street through Stover Park and the adjacent Telford Borough Park up to Erie Avenue. The route will transition to sharrows, LBT signs and sidewalks along 4<sup>th</sup> Street up to the Penn Valley church property. A short spur trail will connect to the existing shared use path at the rear of Centennial Park. A proposed shared use path will be created on the church property along the tree line between 4<sup>th</sup> Street and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street. The route will use sharrows, LBT signs and sidewalks along Franconia Ave up to Church Road. The route will cross Church Road to Indian Valley Lane. The route will continue Indian Valley Lane where sharrows will be used with the existing sidewalks through this quiet neighborhood. Lenape Lane will also have sharrows up to the intersection with Main Street. Trail users will use the existing sidewalk up to the intersection of Main Street/Driveway into Landis supermarket. A side path is envisioned to be constructed alongside the supermarket driveway up to North Hamilton Street where the LBT will connect to an existing paved trail into Telford's Municipal Park which is the ending point for this study area.

**Environmental Constraints**: No major environmental constraints present.

**Bicycle/Pedestrian Connectivity**: Connections to Lawn Avenue Park, Chestnut Street playground, Broad theater/Freewill Brewery Taproom. Connections to Indian Crest Middle School, Souderton Community Park and Pool, Centennial Park, Telford Municipal Park, Indian Valley Library and Landis Supermarket.

**Utility Impacts:** No major utility conflicts are anticipated.

**Construction Challenges**: No major construction challenges.

**Implementation Strategies**: Construct trail on Souderton Borough parcel at southeast corner of Souderton Hatfield Pike/Cherry Lane as part of the future construction of the new public works building. Install sharrows, LBT signs and signal improvements along entire route within existing road right of way. Install trail on Middle School and park properties along Crest Ave and 4<sup>th</sup> Street up to Erie Ave. Start discussions with Penn Valley Church about easement for the trail.



#### 6) Right of Way Acquisition Options

If is required to acquire the necessary right of way, easements and other agreements needed to construct long, linear projects like this one, the following well-established methods are available to obtain the land needed for the project:

- 1. Easements: One of the least costly and most effective methods for acquiring the legal permission for the trail to cross a property is through a permanent easement agreement. This easement agreement would be a legal document that modifies the property owner's deed to allow the use of a portion of their property for the construction of the trail and permanent use of the area by trail users. A sample easement agreement successfully used by Doylestown Township on several previous trail projects is included in the Appendix. Typically, the municipality or other agency would be responsible for maintenance and liability issues related to the trail within the easement.
- 2. Lease Agreement: This type of document is like an easement except that a specific time frame is stipulated in the agreement for use of the area for the trail. Some private property owners may have long range plans for their properties and may not want to have a permanent easement attached to their deed. However, these agreements are usually formed for relatively long time periods such as 10-20 years or more, are typically renewable and can function just as well as permanent easements.
- 3. Fee Simple Purchase: Another more costly alternative and potentially time-consuming method is the outright purchase of portions of property from owners. If easements or other agreements cannot be formed, the County can negotiate a land purchase from a property owner for the trail. This process can often be complicated by disagreements over property appraisals, questions of property ownership, the need for right of way plans and modifications to deeds. However, this process is commonly used on transportation projects and could be used for trail projects as well.

Public grants are often used to fund the construction of trail projects. This funding can have an influence on the right of way acquisition process since they are governed by federal and state laws. It is recommended that this process be discussed with the funding agency for each grant funded project to avoid any missteps or rework in these procedures.



#### 7) Implementation Plan and Cost Estimates

Developing an implementation plan for completion of this trail is an important step to take it from the planning stage into the design and construction stages. Dividing the corridor into logical sections that connect people to local destinations is a key to a realistic implementation plan that funding agencies can support. The first step is typically identifying those "low hanging fruit" projects that will be easiest to implement in the short term and develop quick successes and develop momentum for the harder, longer-term efforts. See the following list for these projects:

#### Low hanging fruit projects:

- Lansdale Borough Complete "Phase 3" of LBT from Moyers Road to Tremont Drive Already funded through TASA grant!
- Upper Gwynedd Township Complete widening of sidewalks within Parkside Place Park from the south end of the park along the Parkside Place roadway to connect to the Sumneytown Pike traffic signal.
- Upper Gwynedd Township Complete widening of sidewalk and new trail on Dodsworth Preserve property frontage on Dickerson Road.
- Hatfield Borough/Township Have Didden Greenhouse development project construct the shared use path or provide easement from Vine Street to 1400' south of Vine Street.
- Souderton Borough At the corner of Souderton Pike/Cherry Lane, install 600' of shared use path as part of new public works building project.
- Souderton Borough Add LBT Signs and sharrows from Souderton Pike/Cherry Lane to Indian Crest Middle School along Town Route.
- Souderton Borough Widen path on Indian Crest Middle School property along Crest Ave from Route 113 to 4<sup>th</sup> Street. (Need easement on school property) and widen sidewalk /install shared use path in Stover Park along 4<sup>th</sup> Street to Eric Avenue.
- Franconia Township Complete trail in Open Space Parcel from Meeting House Road to Allentown Rd into Franconia Park
- Franconia Township Construct Trail on Souderton Area High School and on adjacent Open Space Parcel. (Need easement on school property.)

#### **Next Steps:**

The study identified several alternative alignments, evaluated the feasibility of these alternatives, and recommended a preferred trail alignment. The next steps to bring this study's findings into reality includes:

- Explore Grant Opportunities for Engineering Design and Construction Funding
- Complete Engineering Design
- Complete Project Construction

Middle and Long-Term Next Steps:

- Pursue easements on remaining sections
- Pursue grant funding for design and construction as follows:
- Utilize DCNR grants for projects involving parks or having parks or existing trails as a destination (Section 1, 3 &7)
- Utilize PennDOT TASA and PennDOT Multimodal grants for projects involving development of side paths along roadways, where trail upgrades will enhance bike/ped safety, and to provide multimodal transportation upgrades to existing roadways for share the road/sharrows. Also utilize this funding for to develop safe routes to school. (Section 5,6 &7)
- Consider DCED Greenways and Trails Program and DCED Multimodal grants for other trail sections



#### 10) **Funding Options:**

Securing adequate funding for the design and construction of these types of projects can be a challenge. The following is a list of possible funding sources for this project:

#### Pennsylvania Transportation Alternatives Program

The Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside (TASA) provides funding for projects and activities defined as transportation alternatives, including on- and off-road pedestrian and bicycle facilities, infrastructure projects for improving non-driver access to public transportation and enhanced mobility, community improvement activities, and environmental mitigation, trails that serve a

transportation purpose, and safe routes to school projects.

In March 2021, the Liberty Bell Trail (LBT) Feasibility Study consultant team launched an online WikiMap site that allows community members to provide feedback on the proposed trail. The LBT WikiMap provides a general geographic area for the potential trail and has an interactive feature where community members can place 'pins' on the map to highlight where there are opportunities, challenges/barriers, and key destinations. The WikiMap will be a living document and key tool throughout the LBT Feasibility Study process and will be updated as alignment options are presented to and evaluated by the community. At the May 11<sup>th</sup>, 2021 LBT Feasibility Study Steering Committee meeting, Michael Baker senior planner Hannah Clark provided an overview of feedback received thus far via the WikiMap platform. The following information was summarized and shared with the Steering Committee:

#### WikiMap Survey

When community members choose to place a 'pin' on the WikiMap, they are asked to sign-up and fill out a brief survey in order to continue. The LBT WikiMap survey asks general questions about trail support, trail usage, and how one accesses the trail. As of early May 2021, the WikiMap survey had received around 126 unique responses. Survey highlights include:

- 95% of survey respondents are supportive of local trails and developing future trails; 5% are unsupportive
- The top 3 reasons for trail usage are:
  - o Exercise
  - Recreation
  - Access to nature
- The majority of trial users access the trail by bike or by foot. Some trail users access the trail by car. Very few trail users access the trail via public transit.

#### WikiMap Pins – Access locations, Destinations, Barriers

The main feature of the WikiMap is utilizing the 'pins' to indicate Desired Access locations along the trail, Destinations from the trail, and Barriers to bicycling and walking. The current LBT



Wikimap highlights the general area where a future LBT could be constructed. The proposed LBT crosses through and/or is adjacent to 8 municipalities: Telford Borough, Franconia Township, Souderton Borough, Hatfield Borough, Hatfield Township, Lansdale Borough, Upper Gwynedd Township, and North Wales Borough.

In order to better analyze the unique access locations, destinations, and barriers across these municipalities, the consultant team has divided the municipalities into 3 geographically based sub-groups. Below is a summary of access locations, destinations, and barriers by sub-group:

#### Telford Borough/Souderton Borough/Franconia Township

- Access locations: None currently listed on WikiMap
- Destinations: None currently listed on WikiMap
- Barriers:

We the undersigned, residents and tax payers of Upper Gwynedd Township, do hereby request that Upper Gwynedd Township not apply for Open Space Funds and cancel plans to develop a trail between West Point Pike and North Wales Road, along the PECO right of way. The taxpayers and residents of Upper Gwynedd Township believe that this proposed path for the trail has many unprotected and dangerous obstacles that can result in lawsuits to the township and taxpayers and major losses to residents along the trail.

## Our specific concerns are as follows:

- We recognize this trail will create a major loss of security. We will face increased potential for vandalism, theft, noise, and trespassing.
- We will experience a major loss of privacy a major aspect that drew us to homeownership in this area to begin with.
- Many glaring safety hazards are inherent in trail use along unprotected active train tracks and high-tension transmission wires, and crossing of major roadways. No provision has been made for patrol of trail activities 24/7.
- There has been no planning for trail costs to cover maintenance, security, and clean up. Who will be responsible for this? The taxpayers.
- Homeowners are aware that property values will depreciate significantly.
- There are no plans to limit the type of usage on this trail. Will ATV's, motorcycles, snowmobiles, rollerblades, skateboards, and bicycles be in competition with pedestrians? Again, who will patrol these activities?
- Parents have legitimate serious concerns for their children's safety. Strangers, pedophiles and kidnappers and thieves will have easy access to our homes.
- Access areas to the trail have not been defined other than from Upper Gwynedd Township Park. Neighbors do not want street parking and access across private property.







#### Stakeholder Interviews

#### **Bill Jackson Interview**

#### July 22nd, 2:30 pm

How familiar are you with the LBT?

Bill does triathlons, so he does a lot of road biking and running in the area. He saw a
news story about the LBT ribboncutting in Lansdale, and through that learned more
about the history of the LBT as well as about other trails in the region.

What destinations are important to connect with via the LBT?

- Bill would like the LBT to connect to West Point (where he lives), to the YMCA (up West Point Pike, he already bikes this), to the Farmer's Market a bit farther up, as well as to the restaurants in downtown Lansdale.
- Bill would also like to connect to Park Place, and he works at the Upper Gwynedd Merck location and would like to bike there.
- Bill would like to be able to explore Hatfield via trails more.

Do you use existing trails in your area? Do you seek out longer-distance trails (i.e., Wissahickon, Pennypack)?

- Bill uses local trails, and often rides up to Doylestown to use trails up in that area. Bill rides the SRT fairly frequently, but has to drive to it.
- Bill also rides the Perkiomen frequently.
- Bill currently rides the LBT in Lansdale and Hatfield Borough.

Would you like to see new trails built? If so, what amenities would you like to see on the trails?

- Bill would like to see new trails built. He would like to see restrooms on the trail. You
  can use the restroom in Park Place 8-9 months of the years, but in Lansdale and
  elsewhere it can be tough to find public restrooms.
- Bill would like there to be bike racks on more trails he doesn't feel there are currently enough.
- Bill also likes water bottle filling stations (there are some in Lansdale), as well as tool stations (with air pumps, allen keys, etc.)

Based on your knowledge of the area, what difficulties/obstacles do you anticipate to trail development? How does your community/the people you know feel about trails and trail building in your area?

- Bill has seen a good amount of "extreme opposition" to the LBT on Nextdoor (social media app/website). This seemed to mainly be people south of the West Point area.
   However, he doesn't feel that there will be a lot of opposition in Upper Gwynedd. He says most people he's talked to think the trail is a good thing.
- Bill sees difficulty getting the Power Line Trail across the SEPTA lines where it is currently shown.

#### Any other thoughts or questions?

- Upper Gwynedd has small connectors that are not shown on road maps. Bill does not think these would necessarily be useful for building the LBT, but they could be worth linking into as spurs that connect you to quiet streets, parks, libraries, shopping areas, etc.
- Bill did offer to show Patrick around the area he extended the invite to me as well.
- Bill brought up the concept of "Blue Zones" areas that are walkable/bikeable/etc./have activities that keep people healthy without having to dedicate time to exercise.

### **Lansdale Area Running Club Interview**

#### July 14th, 10:00 am

How familiar are you with the LBT?

 Both say they're fairly familiar with the trail, they both use the Lansdale sections of the trail.

What destinations are important to connect with via the LBT?

- Jen would like to see the trail connect all the way up to Souderton, so she can run all the way up to Bucks County
- Christine doesn't have a destination in mind, but would like to see the LBT as off-road and away from cars as possible. She would utilize sections that are off-road before sections that are on-road these make her uncomfortable.

Do you use existing trails in your area? Do you seek out longer-distance trails (i.e., Wissahickon, Pennypack)?

- Jen & Christine use lots of trails in the region: Perkiomen Trail, Green Ribbon Trail, Pennypack, Wissahickon, Saucon Valley Rail Trail.
  - They have to drive to these trails can't access on foot or by bike.
  - Christine likes the Perkiomen Trail because it connects into the SRT, which connects you into the City, or you can take it the opposite way into Green Lane.

Would you like to see new trails built? If so, what amenities would you like to see on the trails?

- Jen would like to see Porta-potties or bathrooms, as well as something to refill your water. Mile markers would help from a safety aspect as would the blue safety pillars that you can call the cops directly from.
- Christine would like to see signage, especially if she is not familiar with the area she's in. She would also like to see shade, especially in the summer.
  - Christine thinks it's always nice to have a destination to stop at off the trail (Moishe's off the Perkiomen Trail), etc.

Based on your knowledge of the area, what difficulties/obstacles do you anticipate to trail development? How does your community/the people you know feel about trails and trail building in your area?

- Jen does not see a lot of potential difficulties in the area. She also thinks that most people in the area would be in support of the LBT.
- Christine can't think of any particular difficulties getting the trail built. She wonders why
  people who may not be interested in trails are also mad when they see runners and
  bikers in the road?
  - Christine did mention that crime could be a deterrent, but that it would likely be area-dependent.

Are there any critical stakeholders/interest groups we've missed? (Show them the list/mention some names)

Neither could think of anyone we had missed.

Any other thoughts or questions for me?

Christine asks if the next SAC meeting will be at 10 am, and I said it doesn't have to be it will be whenever works for the most people.

### **Larry Stevens Interview**

#### June 11th, 2:00 pm

- Larry is somewhat familiar with the plans for the LBT to date, and of course with the sections in the Hatfields
- Larry thinks the LBT would be very welcome in Hatfield Borough; the people he knows
  use the LBT in Hatfield as well as the municipal trail network that connects into it
- He thinks that the more of the trail that is built (i.e., the longer it becomes), the more
  people will use it, the more popular it will become, and the more people will want to
  continue building the trail/fill in gaps
- Larry likes the idea of having restroom facilities on/near the trail, as well as water fountains
  - Larry likes to ride his bike on the trail, but could see how benches would be a nice amenity for walkers
- Larry thinks the biggest issue with getting the trail built will be keeping it offroad/finding areas where it would be feasible to build the trail off-road
  - If any part of the trail has to be on-road, he thinks it will need to be as protected as possible (i.e., parking-protected bike lanes/cycletracks, etc.)
- Larry has just recently gotten back into biking so usually sticks to the local trails, but has recently begun exploring other longer-distance trails in the region, such as those in the Wissahickon and Pennypack
- Larry is the founder and president of the Hatfield Museum & Historical Society

## Margaret Rhode Interview

#### June 29th, 10:00 am

How familiar are you with the LBT?

 Margaret is somewhat familiar - she used to live in Hatfield Borough and has been on that section several times.

What destinations are important to connect with via the LBT?

- From Margaret's perspective, she'd like the LBT to connect to other trails and to transportation destinations.
  - She'd like to LBT to connect into the Green Ribbon Trail, the Powerline Trail (close to Doddsworth's Run) - they are always trying to connect the Green Ribbon Trail to this preserve; could a spur of the LBT help do this?

Do you use existing trails in your area? Do you seek out longer-distance trails (i.e., Wissahickon, Pennypack)?

- Margaret likes to hike longer distances with elevation changes, so often if she goes hiking she tends to travel to where she can do longer distance, backpacking hikes (Poconos, Western Pa, etc.)
- Margaret is on a lot of the trails in the area for work. She does like birding, so if she is going to do that she tends to use the Gwynedd Preserve.

Would you like to see new trails built? If so, what amenities would you like to see on the trails?

- Margaret is interested in a more permeable type of trail surface (crushed stone as opposed to pavement).
- Margaret thinks it would be useful to have benches, especially for older people to stop more to take a break.
- Restrooms are also super important.
- Educational signage along the trail, or an educational raingarden to offset some of the impact of development and to educate the public.

Based on your knowledge of the area, what difficulties/obstacles do you anticipate to trail development? How does your community/the people you know feel about trails and trail building in your area?

- Other than NIMBY-ism, Margaret does not see many obstacles to trail development.
- Margaret thinks the local community would be really excited about the LBT, especially
  people who volunteer with Wissahickon Trails and in the local preserves. There are lots
  of runners and bikers who are always looking for a new place to run/bike.

Are there any critical stakeholders/interest groups we've missed? (Show them the list/mention some names)

• Margaret can't think of too much more, other than if there are groups of elderly walkers (retirement communities).

• Margaret and Wissahickon Trails is definitely in support of the LBT and is happy to promote it.

Property owner's land, including but not limited to its grounds, trees, fences, walls or other structures which may have been damaged, relocated or removed during the construction period.

- (b) The Township shall provide the Property Owner with the plans, drawings and specifications for all work performed on the Property Owner's property, and shall provide the Property Owner with reasonable notice prior to commencing such work; and
- (c) The Township assumes all responsibility for major maintenance such as patching and repaving the trail surface. The Property Owner shall be responsible for routine maintenance of the trail and easement area such as mowing the grass, trimming trees and snow removal
- 8. The Township reserves the right to terminate the easement and right-of-way at any time.
- 9. The Township assumes all risks of loss, damage or injury by reason of the condition of the Property Owner's property. The Township shall indemnify and save harmless the Property Owner, its members, successors and assigns against all loss, claims, injuries, expenses or damage arising, directly or indirectly, from this Agreement and/or the proposed Trail.
- 10. Property Owner also retains, reserves, and shall continue to enjoy the use of the surface of such property for any and all purposes which do not interfere with and prevent the use by Township of the easement including the right to build and use the surface of the easement for drainage ditches and private streets, roads, driveways, alleys, walks, gardens, lawns, plating or parking areas and other like uses and/or to dedicate all or any part of the surface of the property affected by this easement for use as a public street, road or alley. Provided it does not affect the eased area. Or damages the improvements made by the Township. If the trail is damaged by the property owner, the Township shall be reimbursed for those damages.
- 11. The Property Owner reserves the right to temporarily close the Trail or limit access to the Trail during maintenance of their land and facilities and during any ceremony taking place on the property. During these events, it is the Property Owner's responsibility to place signs at the entrances to the property stating the Trail is closed.
- 12. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective heirs, successors and assigns, and the terms "Property Owner", "Doylestown Township", and "Township" herein shall include their respective heirs, successors and assigns.
- 13. This Agreement is appurtenant to Property Owner's property and shall be construed to be covenants running with the land binding upon the Property Owner and the Township, and their respective heirs, successors and assigns.
- 14. This Agreement may not be modified except by written agreement of the parties.
- 15. This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and all the easement rights and responsibilities shall be exercised in

compliance with all applicable laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations along with all approvals granted by all governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the Property.

- 16. The provisions of this Easement Agreement shall be severable. If any provision is found to be invalid, unenforceable, unconstitutional and/or void, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall, nevertheless, remain valid and binding.
- 17. In the event that any of the provisions of this Easement Agreement should, for any reason whatsoever, not be noted or recited in any subsequent deed for the Property Owner's property or any portion thereof, such terms, conditions and restrictions shall attach to this Property or any portion thereof under and pursuant to this Agreement notwithstanding the absence of such provisions in said deed.
